# Factfulness: Ten Reasons We're Wrong About the World – and Why Things are Better Than You Think – Anna Rosling Ronnlund, Hans Rosling, and Ola Rosling Hans Rosling

Factfulness, a 2018 book by Hans Rosling and his family, encourages readers to base their opinions on facts and logic, not emotions or preconceived ideas. The book explores how human instincts distort our perception of reality and make us believe the world is worse than it is. Rosling uses decades of data to challenge common beliefs, such as the world is becoming more violent or that poverty is increasing.

Chung details her childhood struggles with racism and feeling like an outsider in both her white community and Asian heritage

#### **One Thousand White Women** - Jim Fergus

One Thousand White Women is the story of May Dodd and a colorful assembly of pioneer women who, under the auspices of the U.S. government, travel to the western prairies in 1875 to intermarry among the Cheyenne Indians. The covert and controversial "Brides for Indians" program, launched by the administration of Ulysses S. Grant, is intended to help assimilate the Indians into the white man's world. Toward that end May and her friends embark upon the adventure of their lifetime. Jim Fergus has so vividly depicted the American West that it is as if these diaries are a capsule in time.
